Great Ways to Use These Pages:

Storytelling Tool: Photocopy the Bible story coloring page to use as a visual aid during storytelling time. As you tell the story, color in parts of the picture to keep children's interest and to help them focus on the part of the story you are telling. For larger groups, make



transparencies and color them on an overhead projector as you tell the story.

Felt Board Figures: Glue a colored Bible story coloring page to poster board. Cut out the main characters and then glue strips of felt to the backs of the characters. Use them with a felt board to give visual impact to your Bible storytelling.

Story Review: Photocopy a coloring page for each student.

After telling the story, ask questions to review the story as children color.

Review for Early Arrivals and Transition
Times: Photocopy coloring pages of Bible stories
you have recently talked about. Early arrivals
can have a choice of pictures to color, giving
you opportunities to ask questions and talk with

children about those stories. Also have copies available for children who finish an activity ahead of others and for other transition times.

Coloring Game: After you've told the Bible story, place a variety of colored markers on the table. Distribute copies of the Bible story coloring page. Volunteers tell one part of the Bible story. Then each child chooses a marker and uses it to color one part of his or her page. When they're finished,

children put markers down and volunteers tell another part of the story. Children then choose another marker and color another part of the page. Repeat the process until the pages (and story!) are completed.



Concentration Game: Photocopy a set of two pictures of each story you have talked about recently. Invite volunteers to color each set alike. Then place the pictures facedown on the floor. Children take turns turning over two pictures at a time, trying to find two matching pictures. Play continues until all picture sets have been paired.

Guessing Game: Color (or invite volunteers to color) five or more coloring pages



of Bible stories you have talked about. Display completed pictures. Give three clues for a story. Children try to guess which story you are describing. For example, for "Jesus is born" you could say, "I'm thinking of a happy night. I'm thinking of some good news that some people heard. I'm thinking of a very special baby."

*Individual Coloring Books: Photocopy several Bible story coloring pages for each child in your class. Fold 11x17-inch (28x43-cm) construction paper in half, insert pages and staple to make individual coloring books.

Bible Story Puzzle: Color and then paste a completed Bible story coloring

page onto poster board. Cover with clear adhesive paper and cut into puzzle pieces. Place puzzle pieces in a resealable sandwich bag and label. Make several puzzles and offer them during transition times or to early arrivals.

Puppets: Color (or invite children to color) the main characters on the Bible story coloring page. Glue the colored page to poster board. Cut around the figures and glue the characters to craft sticks. Give to children to use as stick puppets.

Parent Involvement: Send home with children two copies of a Bible story coloring page with the story photocopied on the back. Include a note to encourage parents to read the Bible story and color the pages with their children.

Special Gift: Give this book to your children as a great substitute for secular coloring books.


God creates the world.


Soon it was time to thank God for everything He had given to Adam and Eve's family. Cain brought an offering of some vegetables he had grown. Abel brought some of his sheep.





Isaac is born.


Genesis 15:1-6; 17:1-8; 18:1-15; 21:1-7

Joseph's brothers sell him.


Genesis 37:2-36

Exodus 1:1-22

There was a new king in Egypt now. This Pharaoh didn't know the good things that Joseph had done for his country. He was afraid of the Israelites because there were so many of them. Exodus 14:1-31

"We're hot," God's people said. "We're thirsty!" The sun got hotter and hotter. Their water was just about all gone.

Then someone shouted, "Look! Water!" The people hurried to the edge of the water. They took big drinks—but then they stopped. "This water tastes bad!" the people complained. "Moses, what are we going to do?"

Exodus 16:1-36

The people were hungry. They had been traveling in the desert for many days. They didn't have any more good food to eat. The people started to complain. They forgot that God would take care of them.

God told Moses that He was going to give His people food from heaven.

The next morning there were strange white flakes all around on the ground. "This is bread from the Lord," Moses told the people. The people called the bread manna. It tasted like crackers made with honey. All the people worked together to pick up the manna. Every day each person had enough to eat.

But two of the men, Joshua and Caleb, knew God would keep His promise to give them the land. "Don't be afraid," they said. "The Lord is with us." But the Israelites didn't believe Joshua and Caleb.

God told Moses that because these people did not trust Him, they would not be able to go to the Promised Land for a long time. The people would have to live in the desert for many more years. But God promised Joshua and Caleb would get to live in the Promised Land because they trusted God.

The people were thirsty. They came to Moses. "Why did you make us come out here to the desert?" they said. "Why did you make us leave Egypt? There is nothing good to eat here. There is no water."

Numbers 21:4-9



Moses prayed. Then God told Moses what to do to help the people. Moses made a special pole and put a snake made of metal on the top of the pole. When the people looked at the pole, God would make them well. Once again, God had helped the Israelites out of trouble as they traveled to the Promised Land.

Joshua 4


God's people were amazed! They were standing in the land that God had promised to give them long ago. They had traveled for years across the desert. God had led them all the way! And God had stopped the rushing river, so they could cross safely on dry ground.

When all the people and animals had safely crossed to the other side, Joshua told 12 men to go back into the riverbed. He told them to pick up large stones.

The men went into the riverbed. Each man picked up a large smooth stone. They brought the stones

back to where Joshua and all the people were standing. The priests followed the men out of the riverbed, and CRASH! All the water came pouring back down the river again, just as it had been. No one would have guessed that it had ever been dry.

Joshua piled the stones into a big stack near the river. Whenever the people saw the stones, it would remind them how God had helped them cross the river on dry ground and come to the land God had promised them.

Joshua 6:1-20

Joshua and the Israelites were in the land God had promised them. They were camped outside the city of Jericho. All around the city there was a huge wall made of rocks. The people of Jericho closed the gates to their city. They did not let anyone in or out. They were afraid of the Israelites, but they felt safe behind their city's big wall.

God told Joshua that the Israelites would take over the city of Jericho. God told Joshua what to do. Joshua and the Israelites did just what God said.

All of the Israelite men marched in a long line near the city wall. Some of the priests marched with them. The priests carried the box that held God's laws. Other priests blew on horns as they

marched. They marched one time all the way around the city wall. That's all they did for six davs!

Then on the seventh day, the Israelites marched around the wall seven times. Then they stopped The priests blew the longest, loudest blasts they could make on their horns. And Joshua led the people to shout with loud voices!

As the Israelites shouted, CRASH! The wall around the city fell flat to the ground! The Israelites marched straight into the city. God had helped the Israelites take over Jericho, just as God had promised.

Joshua 9

When Joshua led the Israelites into the Promised Land, other people were already living there. Many of these people and their kings wanted to fight against the Israelites. But one group of people, the Gibeonites, knew that God was helping the Israelites. They knew they could not win a fight against God! So they made up a plan to trick the Israelites.

Some of the Gibeonite men dressed up in wornout, dirty clothes. They put on old sandals with holes in the bottoms. They packed dried-out moldy bread into old, cracked leather bags for their tired-looking donkeys to carry. Then they walked over to the Israelite camp.

The men told the Israelites they had come from a faraway country and wanted to be their friends.

Joshua and his helpers looked at the Gibeonites' old sandals and moldy bread. Joshua thought the Gibeonites were telling the truth. He forgot to ask God what to do. He agreed to be friends with the Gibeonites. Joshua promised that the Israelites would not fight against them.

But three days later Joshua found out the Gibeonites were really their neighbors! He angrily marched the Israelite army over to their camp. Joshua told them he would keep his promise. Israel would not fight against the Gibeonites, but the Gibeonites must become the Israelites' workers. The Gibeonites agreed. After all, it was easier to be helpers than to fight against an army helped by God!



God makes the sun stand still.

Joshua 10:1-15

Five kings who lived in the Promised Land had heard that the Gibeonites and Israelites made a promise to be friends. That made them angry. The kings decided to attack the Gibeonites. The Gibeonites were surprised. The Gibeonites needed help, quickly! They sent a messenger to Joshua and asked for his help.

Joshua had promised to help the Gibeonites, so he called for his army. The army began marching to Gibeon. They marched all night! As they marched, God told Joshua that they would win the battle.

The next morning the enemy armies woke up. They were surprised to see Joshua and his army.

The enemies tried to run away, but God sent hail that stopped them. But there were still more enemies, and the sun was going down soon.

So Joshua prayed. He said, "Let the sun stand still! Give us extra daylight until we win this fight." And that's exactly what happened. God stopped the sun from going down. Deborah loved God and listened to Him. God told Deborah messages to give to His people. Many people came to talk to Deborah. She helped the people know how to obey God.



An angel talks to Gideon.


Judges 6:1-24

Samson is strong. Judges 13:1-25; 16:1-22


Samson is strong.



Abigail is wise.


1 Samuel 25:2-42

1 Kings 11:1-13,28-40



For years, Solomon's wives told him to worship these false gods. After a while, Solomon began to do what his wives said to do. Solomon even prayed to these statues because he thought they had some sort of power. Solomon disobeyed God

God told Solomon, "You know that I have always said to worship only Me. You have disobeyed Me. After you die, I am going to divide your kingdom

in two. Your son will be king over only a small part. One of your servants will be king over the biggest part." God's words made Solomon sad. But he still disobeyed God and did not ask God to forgive him.

One day, Solomon's servant Jeroboam was walking on a road. He met a prophet who showed God's message to Jeroboam. The prophet ripped Jeroboam's coat into 12 pieces. He told Jeroboam to take 10 of the pieces because he would rule most of Solomon's kingdom. Solomon heard what happened and did another foolish thing—he tried to kill Jeroboam! Even though Solomon was the wisest man who ever lived, he stopped being wise when he stopped obeying God and loving Him more than anything else.




God sends ravens with food for Elijah.

1 Kings 17:1-6

Ahab was the new king of Israel. Ahab didn't worship God. Ahab built places to worship idols instead of God. Many of the people in Israel stopped worshiping God because of the evil things that Ahab did. God was angry with Ahab.

Elijah didn't worship idols. Elijah obeyed God. Elijah went to see King Ahab. "There won't be any rain for a long time," Elijah said. "There won't be any rain to make the food in the fields grow. There won't be any rain to make the grass green. There won't be any rain to give the people water to drink." Ahab was very angry.

So God told Elijah to hide from the king. Elijah left the city. He walked and walked. Elijah came to a brook. Elijah drank some water from the brook. God told Elijah to stay by the brook. God told Elijah that birds called ravens were going to bring food to him. Every morning and every evening the ravens came with bread and meat for Elijah to eat.

1 Kings 17:7-16

In the land of the Israelites there had not been any rain for a long time. God had helped the prophet Elijah have enough food and water. But soon the brook near Elijah dried up. God told Elijah to go to a certain town. God said that a woman who lived in that town would give Elijah food.

Many Israelites stopped worshiping God. They worshiped idols instead. Elijah said, "How long will you do this? Worship the one true God!" But the people didn't listen.



2 Kings 4:1-7


A woman's husband died. The woman had no money to pay her bills. The bill collector said, "Give me your two sons so I can sell them as slaves and get my money back."

Josiah hears God's Word.


2 Kings 22:1-23:3; 2 Chronicles 34:14-32

holiday God's people celebrate to remember how God had helped the Israelites escape from slavery in Egypt. People were excited as they heard the news that they could worship God again in the Temple.

On the day Passover began, there was a large crowd of people in Jerusalem. For the first time in a long time, people from Israel and Judah worshiped God together. Everyone was so glad to celebrate God's goodness that they kept celebrating for another whole week!

Job 1—2:10; 42

A man named Job had some terrible things happen to him. A huge storm killed all his children, his animals were all stolen, and he had gotten very sick. Job was very sad. Jonah disobeys God.


Jonah 1-2:10

God protects Daniel's friends in a furnace.


Daniel 3:1-30

Daniel loved God and prayed to Him every day. In fact, he prayed three times every day. Daniel knew that praying to God was a right thing to do.



Mary was glad to hear this promise. She praised God.




Jesus is born.

John the Baptist ate locusts (like big grasshoppers) and wild honey. He didn't have good food like you and I have. John the Baptist didn't care about nice clothes or good-tasting food. John the Baptist cared about telling the people that the Savior of the world was coming.

John told the people to stop doing wrong things and start doing good things. John said, "Share your food with people who don't have any. Don't cheat people or steal from them any more. Be happy with what you have." John said that people needed to be ready because Jesus was coming soon.


Peter and Andrew liked to fish. They went fishing every day. Fishing was how they earned money.

Luke 4:14-30





Jesus teaches about the wise and foolish men.


Matthew 7:24-29

Matthew 12:1-14; Mark 2:23—3:6; Luke 6:1-11

They said that obeying these rules was the only way to show love for God. But Jesus said that what God most wanted was for people to love God and love each other.

But Jesus knew how important it was to show love and help someone in need. Jesus made the crippled man's hand well! The man must have been glad and thankful!

Jesus wanted everyone to know that caring for people's needs was one of the best ways to show love for God.

John 3:1-21

The Pharisees were people who thought they knew all about God. Most of the Pharisees didn't like Jesus. They were afraid people wouldn't pay any attention to them if Jesus kept teaching. Most of the Pharisees wanted to make Jesus stop teaching and healing people.


Jesus talks to a Samaritan woman.


Jesus' friends were afraid. But Jesus slept quietly through the storm.



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Jesus sends out 12 helpers.


Matthew 10:1-11

Matthew 14:22-33; Mark 6:45-52; John 6:16-21


Jesus walks on the water and helps His friends.

Matthew 17:1-13; Luke 9:28-36



Jesus tells about a patient father.


Luke 15:11-32

Only one man says thank-you to Jesus.


Luke 17:11-19

"The man got down on his knees in front of the king. 'No! No!' he cried. 'Please wait! I promise to pay you back all the money I owe you!'


"The king felt sorry for the man. He said, 'Get up. I forgive you. You do not have to pay back any of the money you borrowed.'

Jesus told a story about a shepherd who had 100 sheep.



If a sheep would start to walk too far away, the shepherd tapped the sheep with his staff, so it would come back. Sometimes the shepherd used the staff to help a sheep get up after it had fallen.

"Every day, the shepherd counted his sheep as he let them out of the fold. He counted all 100 sheep and made sure they were there. Then he led his sheep out to the hillsides so that they could eat green grass. The sheep drank cool water, too. The shepherd made sure the sheep had enough to eat and drink.

"One day, the shepherd counted his sheep, but he only counted 99! One of the sheep was gone! The shepherd hurried off to find his lost sheep. He looked all over! Then the shepherd heard a little 'Baaa!' He heard it again and looked some more. 'BAAAA!' Then he saw the lost sheep.

"The shepherd reached down and gently lifted the sheep up from where it was stuck. The shepherd laid the sheep across his shoulders. He carried the sheep back to where the other sheep were. The good shepherd was very glad he had found his lost sheep! And the sheep was glad to be back with the good shepherd who always loved and cared for it.

"God loves us like that," Jesus said. "He is glad when we accept His love and obey Him."



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Jesus tells about the good shepherd.

John 10:7-18

Jesus told about a shepherd who took good care of his sheep. Each day he took them to a good place to eat green plants. He found cool water for them to drink. He scared away all the wolves that tried to sneak up on the sheep while they were eating. He knew the name of each sheep. The sheep knew the shepherd's voice, too. They would not come when a stranger called them.

When nighttime came, the shepherd led his sheep to a sheepfold made of rock walls. There was only one doorway. The shepherd counted his sheep as they walked in. When each sheep was inside, the shepherd would lie down to sleep right across the doorway! That way, no robber or wolf could get

into the fold and hurt the sheep. The shepherd protected his sheep.

Jesus told the people listening to the story that they were like sheep! And Jesus said He was like the good shepherd.

Jesus said, "I am the One who protects the sheep. My sheep will be safe because I am their shepherd. I have come so that My sheep might have the best kind of life there is!"

"I am the Good Shepherd," Jesus said. "I give My own life for My sheep." Jesus meant that He loves people so much that He was going to die on the cross to pay for the wrong things we do.

Jesus tells about a good Samaritan. Luke 10:25-37


Jesus tells about a good Samaritan.

Luke 10:25-37

Jesus told this story: A man was going from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he got hurt by some robbers. The robbers took everything the man had and beat him up. Then they went away, leaving him hurt and almost dead.

A priest happened to be walking down the same road. When he saw the man, he passed by on the other side of the road. A Levite (a helper in the Temple) also walked by and saw the hurt man. The Levite didn't help the man either. But then, a Samaritan man came to where the man was. The Samaritan saw that the man was Jewish. He knew that Jews and Samaritans did not like each other. But the Samaritan stopped to help. He bandaged the hurt man's sores and put the man on his own donkey. The Samaritan took him to an inn. He even paid the innkeeper to take care of the hurt man!

Jesus asked, "Who was a neighbor to the man who got hurt?" The one who was a neighbor was the one who helped the hurt man. Jesus wants everyone to help others the same way.

One day Jesus was teaching His friends and other people about God. They were listening carefully to what Jesus was saying. Just then, a group of people came to see Jesus.

Jesus and His friends looked at these people and saw that it was children and their parents. The children and their mothers and fathers were so excited to see Jesus.

But when they came near to Jesus, His friends thought that Jesus was too busy to talk to the children. Jesus' friends said, "Don't bring those children here!" The children and their parents were sad to hear those words. They started to walk away.

Jesus helps a blind man see.


John 9:1-41

Jesus said, "If you want to have life that lasts forever, do all the things God has said to do." The young man asked what those things were.



Jesus told this story so that we would know that God is like the generous farmer. No matter if we accept God's love when we're little or when we're old, God generously gives the free gift of eternal life to anyone who believes in Jesus!




A woman shows love to Jesus.

Zacchaeus climbs a tree to see Jesus.


Luke 19:1-9

Jesus clears the Temple.


Matthew 21:12-16; Mark 11:12-19; Luke 19:45-48

Jesus told about the rich man to help us know that God wants us to use what He gives us to do good things.

John 13:1-17


Jesus and His friends were getting ready to have a special dinner together. They spent the day talking and walking. The roads were hot and dusty.


Jesus dies on the cross.



Jesus cooks breakfast on the beach.


John 21:1-25


God sends the Holy Spirit.

Acts 2:42-47; 4:32-35; 5:12-16


Jesus' followers were telling more and more people the good news about Jesus. And more and more people were becoming part of God's family.


Acts 3:1-16

Every day hundreds of people worshiped God in the Temple in Jerusalem. On their way to the Temple, these people walked through the Temple gate. One man sat by the gate, begging. This man was lame. His feet and legs didn't work. He couldn't walk or run. The lame man asked people who walked by him to put money into his bowl.

One day, Peter and John were on their way into the Temple. The lame man asked them for money. But Peter knew the lame man needed something else. Peter said, "I have no silver or gold to give you. But I will give you what I do have." Peter took the man by the hand. He helped him to his feet and said, "In the name of Jesus, walk!" And the man did!

Now the man could jump! Now the man could leap! He was so excited and happy, he went into the Temple with Peter and John. The lame man praised God! The people in the Temple were amazed. They were surprised that the lame man was now jumping and walking.

Peter said, "Why are you surprised? It is the power of God that has made this man completely well! And this same God sent Jesus to you." The people listened as Peter told them about God's Son, Jesus. Many people who heard believed in Jesus and became part of God's family!

The helpers did a good job! They made sure everyone got the food they needed. Now the widows had enough food to eat. Being kind was one way Jesus' followers showed they loved Jesus.


Jesus talks to Saul.

Ananias obeys God.


Acts 9:10-22

Acts 9:19-25



Acts 16:1-5; Philippians 2:19-22; 1 Thessalonians 3:2-10; 2 Timothy 1




Lydia believes in Jesus.

Acts 17:16-34




Acts 23:12-35

Forty of the men who did not love Jesus promised each other that they wouldn't eat any food or even drink any water until they had killed Paul. Paul's nephew heard about the plan to kill Paul. He went straight to visit his uncle Paul in jail. He told him what he had heard. Paul called one of the guards. "Take this young man to the commander," Paul said. "He has something to tell him "

Paul's nephew went to the commander. "The angry men want to hurt Paul," the nephew said. "Forty men plan to kill him!"

The commander wanted to keep Paul safe. So he called for 200 soldiers, 70 men on horses and 200 men with spears. During the night, all 470 men and their horses started walking out of the city. What a parade! Somewhere in the middle of all those soldiers was Paul! The 40 men waiting to hurt Paul never saw him! Paul had escaped! Now he could keep telling people about Jesus!

One day soldiers brought Paul to a big city. Paul was put in jail there because some people did not want Paul to talk about Jesus. These people asked the governor to keep Paul in jail. The governor's name was Festus.

While Paul was in jail, a king and his wife came to visit Festus. Festus told them about Paul. "Let me hear this man Paul," the king said to Festus.

"All right," Festus said. "I will have Paul come from jail tomorrow so you can hear him talk."

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The believers in Corinth help others.


2 Corinthians 8—9

The Christians in Corinth could have said, "Why should we help those people? They live so far away. God can take care of them!" But they didn't. Each week they collected money to send to Jerusalem.

Later, Paul sent another letter to Corinth: "I'm coming to get the money you have. I'll take it with me to Jerusalem." And that's just what Paul did!

The people in Corinth were glad they could give their money to help others. And the people in Jerusalem were thankful the people in Corinth had cared for them.



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Live by the fruit of the Spirit.

Galatians 1:1-2; 5:16,22-23

Paul wrote many letters to Jesus' followers. One group of people he wrote to were the Galatians.

Paul told the Galatians that God gives His Holy Spirit to help each member of God's family talk and act in good ways. Paul compared the way God's Spirit helps us grow to the way that fruit grows. He wrote about nine good things that we can grow in our lives when God's Holy Spirit is in

Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control are all fruit of the Spirit. God's Spirit wants to help everyone in God's family grow this good fruit in their lives.

Paul writes letters to help others follow Jesus.

2 Timothy 1:1—4:22

Paul wrote many letters to different churches and to different people. Paul wanted to tell others about Jesus. He wanted to help people who loved Jesus know the right things to do. Sometimes Paul wrote letters while he was on a trip. Sometimes he even wrote letters when he was in prison!

Paul wasn't put in prison because he did anything wrong. Paul was put in prison several times because some people didn't want him to tell other people about Jesus.

One time Paul was in a deep, dark dungeon. He wrote a letter to Timothy. Timothy was Paul's friend. Paul wanted to tell Timothy many things. Paul also wanted Timothy to come and visit him in prison. Paul helped Timothy learn how to live as a follower of Jesus.

Be careful to say good words. James 3:2-12

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Be careful to say good words.

James 3:2-12

James was one of Jesus' followers. He wrote a letter to some of God's family. We can read his letter in the Bible. One important thing James wrote about was how our words should show our love for God and others.

James said a person's words are like the bit in a horse's mouth. The direction the horse moves is controlled by the way the bit is moved. James also wrote about the rudder of a boat. The rudder is a part of the boat that can be moved to change the direction of the boat. The bit and rudder are both small, but they make big changes in how the horse or boat move! Our words are a small part of what our bodies can do, but the things we say make a big difference.

James also wrote that our words are like a small flame. It can catch a whole forest on fire! Just a few little words can cause a lot of trouble, too. Sometimes just a few words can lead to anger, murder or even war. Our words can do good or bad things, so we have to be careful about what we say.

James wrote to help us see how important it is to ask for God's help to say only good words.

John writes good news.

Revelation 1:1,2,9-11; 21:3-5

Revelation 1:1,2,9-11; 21:3-5

When Jesus lived on earth, John was one of Jesus' best friends. One day Jesus went back to live with God in heaven. Then John told many people the good news that Jesus loves all people. But some people did not love Jesus. They did not like John, either. They took John away from his home and made him live on a lonely island.

John had to stay on the island a long, long time. Every day he thought about Jesus and prayed. One day when John was praying, something very special happened. John heard a voice say, "Write a book about the things you see. Then send the book to the people who love Me." John knew it was Jesus speaking to him!

Then Jesus showed John what heaven is like. He also showed John some things that will happen later. Jesus is going to come back! People who love Jesus will live with Him forever.

Matthew 27:11—28; John 18:28—19:16; Revelation 4—5



Genesis 7:1-18


One day the big boat, the ark, was finished. God said, "Noah, take your family into the ark. And take a pair of every kind of animal and bird into the ark with you."



Jacob has a dream.


Genesis 27:41-45; 28:10-22

Finally as the sun was going down, the last of the Amalekites ran away. The Israelites had won the battle! Moses, Aaron and Hur dropped their arms. Moses built a special place to thank God. Moses wanted everyone to remember how God had answered their prayers and helped them win the battle!

Joshua 2:1-24

2 Samuel 9





Elijah listens to God.


1 Kings 19:1-18

Daniel was a man who had loved and obeyed God his whole life. One way he showed his love for God was by praying to God three times every day. Daniel was also the most important helper of the king of Babylon. Some of the other helpers were jealous of Daniel. They tried to find something wrong that Daniel had done, so they could tell the king and get Daniel into trouble. But Daniel was always wise and honest.

Finally the jealous helpers planned a way to get Daniel in trouble with the king. They tricked the king into signing a law that said no one could pray to anyone except the king for 30 days. The next day, Daniel prayed to God three times a day just like he always did. Some of the helpers were

waiting by Daniel's open window. When they saw him praying to God, they took him to the king.

The king did not want to punish Daniel, but he couldn't change the law. So Daniel was thrown into a den full of lions! All during the night the king was worried about Daniel. In the morning the king ran to the lions' den to see if Daniel was still alive.

Daniel was alive! He told the king that God had sent an angel to shut the lions' mouths. The king ordered Daniel to be taken out of the den. Then the king told everyone how God protected Daniel. The king made a new rule that everyone should love God and pray only to Him!

Nehemiah 8





Simeon and Anna welcome Jesus.


Luke 2:21-38

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
Jesus heals Jairus's daughter.

Jesus told a story to help people understand how much God loves them.



Acts 4:32-37


One of the ways Jesus' friends showed their love was by sharing everything they had.

Paul and Barnabas visit Lystra.


Acts 14:8-18

Paul wanted to help Onesimus. So he wrote a letter to Philemon. Paul wrote:


Dear Philemon.

Paul gave the letter to Onesimus. Then he said, "You must go back to Philemon. Tell him you are sorry for the wrong things you have done."


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


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
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
